The Dadaab refugee complex in east Kenya has a population of approximately 240,00 registered refugees and asylum seekers.

refugee camps.

Kakuma and Kalobeyei settlements in north-west Kenya host more than 180,000 refugees.

HI works in both camps and aims to improve the living conditions of the most vulnerable refugees, in particular those with disabilities, by ensuring equal access to services, raising awareness of discrimination and building the capacity of staff working with refugees to identify the needs of the most vulnerable.

## **Inclusive Education**

Providing safe, quality and equitable access to inclusive education for 6,000 children with disabilities in Kakuma and Dadaab refugee camps

Vulnerable children especially those with disabilities, face various challenges and barriers, which hinder their effective participation in education, resulting in poor learning outcomes.

## Help improve the quality of life of children with disabilities

The action will build on current initiatives by HI and Lutheran World Federation (LWF) in education programming in Dadaab and Kakuma. Objectives:

- Increased access and retention to equitable learning opportunities for boys and girls, with disabilities, in formal and non-formal education through the 43 primary schools in the project locations
- Improved quality of education and protection services for boys and girls with disabilities through capacity development for teachers and shadow teachers on multi-grade, multi-age, and multi approaches
